

Department of Oregon Welcomes Gunner Kent to the 2018-2019



Allen F. "Gunner" Kent Commander-in-Chief, 1994-1995, Veterans of Foreign Wars of the **United States**

Allen F. "Gunner" Kent was elected Commanderin-Chief of the Veterans of Foreign Wars in 1994. He served as the Veterans Service Organization Liaison in the Department of Veterans Affairs, Washington, D.C., from 1995-2005. In August 2005 he was appointed

Adjutant General of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, a position he held until his retirement in 2013.

Kent was on active duty with the U.S. Marine Corps from 1958 until 1982. He served with the 17th Interrogation and Translation Team, 1st and 3rd Marine Divisions in Vietnam in 1967-68, as well as a six-month assignment with an Army advisory group. He also participated in Operation Frequent Wind, the evacuation of U.S. personnel from Saigon on April 29-30, 1975.

During his military service he received the Bronze Star Medal with Combat V, Navy Commendation Medal, Navy Unit Commendation Medal with 2 stars, Marine Corps Unit Commendation Medal with 2 stars, Combat Action Ribbon with gold star, Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal with 1 star, Humanitarian Service Medal with 2 devices, Presidential Unit Citation, National Defense Medal, Good Conduct Medal with 2 stars, Sea Deployment Ribbon, Vietnam Service Medal with 4 stars, Vietnam Campaign Medal with 60 device, Vietnamese Cross of Gallantry with palm, and the Vietnamese Civic Action Ribbon.

Kent's VFW involvement began in 1968 when he joined Post 2811 in Gainesville, Fla. He has served as Chairman of the Americanism Committee, Vice Chairman of both the National Legislative and National Security and Foreign Affairs committees, and was named All-American Post and Department Commander. He is currently a Gold Legacy Life member of VFW Post 9972 in Sierra Vista, Ariz. He was selected Arizona's "Young Vietnam Veteran of the Year" for

Kent's other affiliations include DAV, AMVETS, Military Order of the Cootie, Marine Corps Mustang Association,

Marine Corps League, Marine Corps Intelligence Association, Marine Corps Interrogator Translator Association, Vietnam Veterans of America, and the Arizona Veterans Hall of Fame.

He and his wife, Rebecca, reside in Sierra Vista, Ariz. They have two grown children, Allen Jr., and Kimberli Kent Harney, and two grandchildren — granddaughter Topaz, and grandson Dakota.

Oregon City Post 1324 Community involvement pays off to honor local Hero

Starting in the spring, Oregon City began the process of naming its newest park. A post member submitted Tyrone S. Woods as a possible name and it became one of the four final choices submitted to public voting.

At the Post August business meeting, Post 1324 passed a motion to support the name and went right to work networking with VFW and community contacts, helping bring in over 8,500 votes; 93 percent for Tyrone. The Parks Department recommended it and the City Commission officially adopted the name on December 5, 2018, presenting a certificate to his mother and members of the Tyrone Snowden Woods Wrestling Foundation.

The new 9.1-acre park will be the Tyrone S. Woods Memorial Park and is located directly behind Oregon City High School, where Woods graduated in 1989 as a champion wrestler. Woods enlisted in the U.S. Navy,



becoming a SEAL and retired as a Senior Chief, Special Operator. In 2012 he sacrificed his life defending other Americans as a protection contractor for the CIA, in Benghazi, Libya. For 13 hours starting on September 11th 2012, he and his team held off massive attacks by hostiles. cont page 2

National Legislative Report

Many of you may have seen the following in the VFW Action Corps: "Utah Senator Stops Blue Water Navy Bill." An objection by Sen. Mike Lee (R-Utah) to passing H.R. 299, the Blue Water Navy Vietnam Veterans Act of 2018, by unanimous consent on the Senate floor Wednesday has effectively doomed any chance of the bill being passed in the 115th Congress. Lee now joins Sen. Mike Enzi (R-Wyo.), who objected last week due to the bill's overall cost. Lee's objection was because he wants to wait and see more evidence. "We don't need more sick veterans to prove sufficient evidence," said VFW National Commander B.J. Lawrence. "Agent Orange made Vietnam veterans sick, and science agrees that there isn't any reason to treat so-called Blue Water Navy veterans any different than their peers who served ashore or on the inland waterways of Vietnam. Their obstruction to this bill's passage forsakes our nation's promise to take care of those who were injured or made ill due to their military service. Their objections put cost above faithful and honorable service."

The VFW showed up in force to a Blue Water Navy Bill press conference in the Cannon House Office Building. House VA Committee Chairman Dr. Phil Roe (R-Tenn.) and incoming Chairman Mark Takano (D-Calif.) hosted the bipartisan event to urge the Senate to pass H.R. 299, The Blue Water Navy Vietnam Veterans Act 2018, which the House passed unanimously 382-0 back in June but has been held up twice in the Senate over the past two weeks by Sen. Mike Enzi (R-Wyo.) and Sen. Mike Lee (R-Utah), who either objected to the bill's cost or wanted to wait for more sufficient evidence. VFW Legislative Director Carlos Fuentes said, "If America can't afford to take care of her veterans, then America should quit creating us."

I am looking for Department and Auxiliary members who plan on attending the March 3-7, 2019 National Legislative Conference. This is your chance to go with me and advocate for veterans with our two Senators and five Representatives in office visits on "The Hill." Our visits are more meaningful when we have members attending from all Oregon legislative districts. In addition, the National Voice of Democracy winners will be named. This is an event that we all should consider attending. We have new Priority Goals and I urge you to go on line at vfw.org and print a copy.


There is much left to be done to realize the completion of this memorial. Fundraising continues, so keep sending your Post donations to the State Quartermaster to be added to this current total.

District Membership Horse Race



Happy New Year members! We have so much to celebrate this year for the membership of the Department of Oregon VFWA. We continue to be in the conference that is in first place in the conference standings, so that means after December 31st, each department in the Western conference will get \$50.00 from National. It's been a long time that the Western Conference has stayed that high in the standings for the first 6 months of the year. We can congratulate all the Western conference departments.

Oregon is currently at 97.02 percent in membership. We continue to be 2nd in the nation in membership and close behind the 1st place department, Alaska. At this time, we only need 10 new or rejoins for us to make our 2nd quarter goal from National and I have heard that we are getting that many in before the end of January. At this time, we only need 159 members to be 100 percent-plus for the year. I am so proud and so amazed how well we are doing this year. I have talked to many of the treasurers of the auxiliaries that are close to being 100 percent and when they could they would help me by going to their next meeting and paying the dues of the members that they could. Please all the rest of the auxiliaries that have quite a few more members left to pay, please look at your list and if some of those members are older or unable to pay their dues get them paid for them. Share the mission and information with veterans, their families and community.

Subscribe to Veterans' Voices. An annual subscription (three issues per year) is \$35.00. (I recently started my subscription. Auxiliaries can also subscribe, or you can buy a subscription for a VA or non-VA medical facility. What a wonderful way to share these meaningful stories!)

Donate. The Veterans' Voices Writing Project is supported solely by contributions from corporations, individuals, and veterans' organizations. Donations help with printing and mailing costs, prizes for writers, maintaining the website, etc. You can make a one-time monetary donation or set up a monthly donation.

If you are interested in starting a writing group in your area, VVWP would be more than happy to help you get started. This can be a very personal and worthwhile kind of volunteer experience!

Why Ships Are Called "She"

After two and a half years of Vietnam service aboard the aircraft carrier USS Coral Sea (CVA-43), I understand why ships are called "She." Even though Coral Sea was not a living thing, I felt she had become so. She had a distinct personality, quirks, and moods. She seemed capable of sadness, exultation and indifference, as well as dashing boldness, pride and unpredictability. She housed us, fed us, carried us across oceans and kept us safe. She took us through a massive typhoon with 130 miles per hour winds that sent gray 40-foot waves spilling over the flight deck.

She was easily recognizable from a distance and could entrance us as she gracefully slipped through still seas, cutting symmetric bow-waves that spread across the surface. In time, the ship became mine, and I fell in love with her. Long after I deserted her, I listened for news of her, and felt that I still knew her intimately. A sailor's attachment to his ship is frequently strong and abiding.

The attachment is also to fellow crew members, a movable community of those who live, eat, sleep, face dangers and work to keep the ship and her mission going. All sailors, from those who first dared to venture out onto the waters, to those who sail in today's technological marvels, are members of a family with shared knowledge, experience and skills. They understand the power, mystery and appeal of the sea.

In combat, or when a ship and her crew have suffered a great tragedy, this attachment to ship and crew may be greater still. The battleship USS Arizona (BB-39) has been at the bottom of Pearl Harbor since 1941. When she was sunk, she took 1,177 men with her, most entombed inside the ship, beyond rescue. Arizona was righted, her superstructure removed, and her guns salvaged for use on other Navy ships. No longer commissioned, the ship still flies the American flag. She is considered a war grave.







Oregon Wounded Warrior Parking Placard

Starting Jan. 1, 2019, Oregon veterans who qualify for a disabled parking permit and have a service-connected disability that is VA-rated at 50 percent or greater may apply for the new Oregon Wounded Warrior parking placard from the Oregon Department of Transportation's Driver and Motor Vehicles division (DMV).

The Oregon Wounded Warrior parking placard exempts the driver from paying fees in public parking areas with metered parking. It also enables veterans to park in time-limited spaces for longer than the posted limit (except in zones that are designated 30 minutes or less).

There is no fee for the placard, and it will carry the same expiration as the veteran's driver license or ID card.

Qualified veterans who already have a disabled parking placard and would like to apply for the Oregon Wounded Warrior designation must fill out Form 735-265, the DMV's application for a disabled parking permit, which will be revised to include a check box for the Wounded Warrior placard.

The revised form will be available on the DMV website at https://www.oregon.gov/ODOT/DMV/pages/driverid/disparking.aspx and at DMV field offices starting Jan. 2. With the completed form, veterans must also submit a copy of their benefit summary letter (also known as the "tax abatement letter") from the U.S. Department of Veterans' Affairs, confirming their service-connected disability rating of 50 percent or greater.

This is a letter that is mailed annually to all disabled veterans. It comes in a bright green envelope. If a veteran needs a copy of this letter, they can log into vets.gov or eBenefits to download one immediately, or they may request a copy from their local county veteran service office or VA regional office.

Veterans who do not already have a disabled parking placard but who meet the qualifications may also apply for the Oregon Wounded Warrior placard. They must fill out Form 735-265 and have their physician sign and confirm that they are eligible for the handicap placard. They must also submit a copy of their benefit summary letter.

The application can be submitted by mail to DMV Headquarters at 1905 Lana Ave NE, Salem, OR 97314. It can also be turned in at any DMV field office.

Qualifying veterans will receive a disabled parking placard or decal with the "Oregon Wounded Warrior" sticker affixed to it.


